

The other photo's I'm sure can have some names put to them"?







Convalier - Transfer at Sea 60-61




Cowalies - Trusper at sea 60-61

Duke of Edinburgh

Fond memories of Prince Philip

FORMER Royal Navy and Merchant Navy seaman Roger Bliss recalled fond memories of Prince Philip, who was laid to rest at Windsor Castle on Saturday.

The nation fell silent in memory of the 99-year-old Duke of Edinburgh, who died earlier this month, while his funeral was

taking place at St George's chapel.

At the Garden of Remembrance in Stratford, Mr Bliss laid a wreath in memory of Prince Philip and raised the union flag at half-mast. Mr Bliss had met the Duke of Edinburgh a couple of times while serving for the Royal Navy and recalled some fond memories.

"He shook my hand and asked where I was from - that's the normal thing royalty do," he said. "At the time he was admiral of the fleet - and was always admiral - and was a bit of an imposing figure.

"Twenty years ago HMS Cavalier, an old wartime destroyer, was saved for the

nation and he helped save it.

"When it came to Chatham to be put into dry dock and become a museum ship, he came and visited and talked to everybody. He was only supposed to be there for one hour, but he was there for five hours and his next duty, which was in London, had to be cancelled.

"He sat down with many of the sailors and had a drink with them. He had a few tots of rum, which did not go down well with his security guys. He always had a great affinity with the Royal Navy and Merchant Navy, and of course all service-

men. He was well thought of."

Mr Bliss added: "They had some nicknames for Prince Philip, but I won't say those at the moment."



After many months of negotiations with Homes England regarding the Dockyard Slipway, the RNSA MEDWAY BRANCH are hopefully in the final stages of signing the lease to remain on the Slipway. We have been tirelessly working throughout the lockdown to ensure that we remain on the Slipway and continue to maintain the sailing links with the Royal Navy.

Sally Mace says:

"The signing of the lease with Homes England is very important for MEDWAY RNSA. The club would probably fold without access to our Moorings. The late Paul Mace (67/69 commission) played such a vital role in the initial negotiations with the Historic Dockyard in 2008. We worked extremely hard to build the club and the facilities that we have today. It would be such a shame to see it all disappear. The area was our second home, I have lost count of the hours spent trying to improve the facilities for our members"

Following Article taken from the Medway Messenger

A group of sailors are due to move out of their riverside home as part of plans for a new development.

The Royal Naval Sailing Association has been operating and maintaining a slipway in the Historic Dockyard Chatham for 11 years, giving a number of clubs including the Sea Cadets Medway Towns and the Sea Scouts access to the River Medway



But this could all come to an end as developers plough on with plans to develop the land.

The groups will begin to move out over the weekend.

The association has used the slipway since 2009 but was handed a letter asking them to leave by April.

Members have been told the plan is for them to return, but they don't know when, or what space they will be allocated. Some fear they will never return at all.

The plans were first signposted by Medway Council in 2017 to develop what is known as the Riverside site – where there is

a slipway giving access to the river – and the Brunel site which lays between the car park for the Dockyard and Dock Road.

Landowners Homes England wrote to the association – which leases the land from the Historic Dockyard but maintains the slipway – in October. The letter gave them until April to clear all of the clubs' equipment and boats.

Association members fear the decision will leave them and the other groups with nowhere to go and have been in talks with Homes England to remain on the site.

Committee member Brian Foreman said: "During the summer it's almost every day that something is going on.

"In terms of looking at the future in Medway, it is another opportunity that kids won't have.



If we are not careful, Homes England will take this site on and that will be the end of it."

Branch captain Sally Mace added: "We were looking to include wider aspects of the community with developing the area."

Under the plans, which include residential, leisure and education use, the slipway would be maintained and incorporated into the development.

But association members are worried about using the site in the interim and what access they will have to it.

Brain, who is from Cranbrook, said: "It's difficult to move that amount of equipment and people.

We think it's totally out of proportion in terms of the effect it will have on the local community."




We featured the story in the Medway Messenger at the start of this month when Homes England spokesman Rosemary Davenport said: "We are pleased to be making progress to develop this important historic site which will not only provide much-needed new homes for the local community; but will enhance access to the slipway for public use.




